



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Editing/Proofreading Terms

adjective:

a describing word, e.g. the tall tree.

adverb:

a word that tells something about a verb, e.g. Jack ran quickly.

apostrophe:

used to show possession, e.g. Lilly's bag or to show that a letter has been left out of a word, e.g. I'm going.

comma:

a punctuation mark used to show a pause in a sentence or to separate groups of things, e.g. apples, plums and pears.

conjunction/connective:

a word that joins two parts of a sentence, e.g. I ate my apple because I was hungry.

exclamation mark:

a punctuation mark used to show strong feelings, e.g. Wo or a command, Fire!

full stop:

a punctuation mark used to so we the sentence has ended.

noun:

a word used to refer to people, places and things, e.g. Lilly, Australia, a bird.

noun group:

an adjective and noun written together, e.g. the big, old house.

phrase:

a group of words without a verb, e.g. at the park.

preposition:

a word that shows time or

place, e.g. in, under, on.

pronoun:

a word used in place of a noun, e.g. he, she, they.

question mark:

a punctuation mark used to show a question is being asked, e.g. Is it raining?

quotation marks (speech marks):

punctuation marks used to show that someone is speaking, e.g. "Can you swim?"

senter se:

a group a wool of that form a state at, question, comment or explanate n, e.g. The dog ran to the boy.

nse

tels, the Lader whether a verb is past, present or future, e.g. I ran, I run, I will run.

text:

written words.

verb:

a word that tells the reader what is happening.

action verbs, e.g. She ran up the hill. thinking and feeling verbs, e.g. James likes soup. saying verbs, e.g. "Time for bed," mum said quietly. relating verbs, e.g. Kangaroos are marsupials.

viewing:

looking at and understanding a visual text, e.g. an illustration, a photo or a diagram.
